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‘Room at the Inn’ Nativity Display Returns to St. Matthew Center for Health on Dec. 6 and 7

On December 6 and 7, for the seventh consecutive year, Oak Park resident Susan Greeley will display her growing collection of more than 300 nativity scenes at St. Matthew Center for Health in Park Ridge. The display will be open from 10 a.m.– 4 p.m. both days. St. Matthew, a program of Lutheran Social Services of Illinois (LSSI), is located at 1601 Western Avenue in Park Ridge.

“I hope visitors will be struck by God’s overwhelming love and generosity by seeing the way other people and other cultures imagine the nativity,” Greeley says. She adds that many visitors return each year to see the display and say it gives them a wonderful sense of peace and inspiration in a troubled world.

Susan and her husband, Pastor Jeff King, take time from their jobs for this event, which is a gift from them to the community. She says, “It takes two 10-hour days for five people to unpack and set up the display. The set-up actually takes longer than the number of hours the display is open. But it’s worth it to see the delight on people’s faces, adults and children alike. It’s such a wonderful feeling to know that other people are enjoying these crèches as much as we do.”

For the second year, groups of students from area parochial schools will be coming to see the display during private viewing hours on Friday. They will be told about the nativity scenes and take part in a nativity scavenger hunt. Children from Christian Heritage Academy in Northfield will sing for St. Matthew’s residents after seeing the exhibit.

The tradition of the nativity scene, or crèche, dates back to 1223. St. Francis of Assisi is said to have been traveling to the Italian village of Greccio at the time, when the sight of shepherds in moonlit

fields evoked images of the first Christmas. Inspired, he beckoned villagers that Christmas Eve to light the sky with their torches, bring their animals and re-enact the nativity. During succeeding centuries, the tradition spread from Italy to the rest of Europe and beyond. Today, many Christian families annually display a crèche, often one that has been handed down from generation to generation.

Susan Greeley is the producer of the radio program “Grace Matters” for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and has traveled extensively. “I bought my first nativity scene in 1980 when I was living in Bogota, Colombia,” she says. Throughout the years, her collection has grown through gifts she receives, as well as through her own purchases. Almost every one of the nativities has some kind of story behind it. Susan will be at St. Matthew to meet visitors and answer questions about the collection.

While viewing this beautiful, inspiring exhibit, guests may register for a chance to win a nativity set donated by the Augsburg Fortress store at 8765 West Higgins Road in Chicago.
